1. STUDENTS' ASSOCIATION

What is SA?

The ACU Students' Association (or SA as it is commonly known) is comprised of all full-time undergraduate students. The organizing body of SA is called Congress, and it operates out of an office in the lower level of the Campus Center. SA serves to advocate for the interests of the student body and to bring forth proposals which would enhance the life of the student body.

Where is the SA office?

Executive and administrative officers maintain regular office hours Monday through

Friday 12-5pm and Congress members complete office hours every week. Come visit the office downstairs in the campus center to meet your representatives, senators, and officers!

When and where are Congress meetings?

Congress meets every Wednesday at 5:15pm in Hart Auditorium. Meetings are open to the entire student body. SA welcomes all students, faculty, staff, and members of the ACU community to come and voice their opinions at any Congress meeting. Call the SA office at 325.674.2583 to sign up for a time to address the Congress.

How can I get involved?

1. Find out who your class senators and representatives are, meet with them, and ask them about their experiences in SA.
2. Come down to the SA office to find out when elections begin.
3. Pick up a petition in the SA office beginning Tuesday, August 25.

When do elections happen?

All Congressional positions are elected in the fall, including class senators, academic representatives, and residential representatives. Elections take place within the first few weeks of the fall semester. Petitions this year will be available for pickup at noon on Tuesday, August 25 and due in the SA office by 5pm Friday, August 28.

How does SA benefit me?

SA strives to engage, equip, and empower every student group. In the SA office we have a variety of resources available for use with student activities. These resources include:

Brass Quintet

Jazz Combo
